CITIES STRUGGLE WITH POLLUTION

Not just China, but Poland, Germany and the UK are also experiencing off-the-charts pollution

<u>China</u> A third of China's cities were blanketed in smog at the beginning of 2017, posing great health risks. Why is air pollution in China on the rise now?

<u>Poland</u> A city in coal-burning Poland, Skala, makes China's air look clean. The city has 979 micrograms of pollution per cubic meter of air, far exceeding Beijing's 737.

<u>Germany</u> Following New Years firework displays particulate levels in Munich reached 26 times the EU-recommended daily limit.

<u>UK</u> Meanwhile, London has already breached its annual air pollution limits (5 days into 2017!).

RISE OF IMPACT INVESTING

Investing with a social or environmental benefit is heading into the mainstream

In the last two years, several large banks and pension funds have joined what was once a niche movement: "impact investing". BlackRock, the world's biggest asset manager, launched a new division called "Impact" while Goldman Sachs, an investment bank, acquired an impact-investment firm, Imprint Capital. Meanwhile, two American private-equity firms, Bain Capital and TPG, launched "impact funds".

However, defining impact varies from investor to investor. For example, for some investment only deserves "impact" status if it delivers both nearmarket level returns AND strict measurement of the non-financial impact. For others the definition is less rigorous. READ MORE

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AIR POLLUTION AND DEMENTIA

Living near air pollution sources can cause dementia; But the US is passing laws to regulate the pollution.

Scientists have found that people living near heavy traffic areas — with high air pollutant concentrations — have a higher risk of developing dementia than those living further away. The study found that pollutants can get into people's brains via their bloodstreams, which can cause inflammation, which is linked to brain disease, cardiovascular disease and diabetes.

Meanwhile, a new US federal rule requires lower sulfur levels in gasoline. What does this mean? Lower levels of pollutants in the air, but perhaps higher gasoline taxes (already seven states have boosted their gasoline taxes). READ MORE

BEVERAGE COMPANIES LYING?


Companies accused of tobacco-like deception

Coca-Cola Co. has been sued by a group who compares the company's advertising tactics to "the tobacco industry's past efforts in minimizing the health effects of its products and targeting children to replenish the ranks of its customers."

The group — Praxis Project — seeks to stop deceptive advertising of sugary drinks, which have been linked to obesity, Type 2 diabetes and cardiovascular disease. "Like the tobacco industry, Coca-Cola needs to replenish the ranks of its customers, and it tries to recruit them young," the group said in its complaint.
